# Demography of Migrants in Germany

The Federal Office for Migration and Refugees (BAMF) is organising in co-operation with the German Association of Demography (DGD) a conference on the "Demography of Migrants in Germany". Many national and international researchers are expected to attend this meeting.

Against the background of the increasing demographic influence of the migrant population in Germany and the raising scientific discussion on the demographic aspects of migrants, this conference aims to present and discuss recent research findings, concepts and explanatory approaches.

International migration gained importance during the last years. Worldwide more than 210 million people are living in a country, which is not their country of birth. The number and share of international migrants might increase in the future.

Therefore detailed information on the demographic behaviour of migrants becomes more and more important. In many industrialised countries like Germany it can be observed, that most of the female migrants come from higher fertility countries and temporarily retain their reproductive behaviour in the destination country. In regard to morbidity and mortality it has been discovered, that shortly after arrival in the destination country immigrants show survival advantages in contrast to the native population (healthy-migrant-effect). But with increasing length of stay these advantages diminish.

The results of this conference will help to estimate the current demographic behaviour of migrants in Germany. They serve as a basis for deducing prognostic analyses on the growing migrant population. 10 May 2010
